Emily Cerier and **Adwaiy Manerikar** (senior author: **Chitaru Kurihara**) <u>published</u> a study about patients on extracorporeal life support and concluded, "Our

study further supports the use of V-V ECMO in treatment of severe ARDS without mechanical Artificial

ventilation, sedation or neuromuscular

blockade to allow for early initiation of PT/OT to improve patients' functional capacity."



Kate Ott (senior author: Aimen Shaaban) <u>published</u> "The interplay between prenatal liver growth and lung development in congenital diaphragmatic her-

nia (CDH)" based on data from 28 fetuses with CDH and found that "Rightsided CDH fetuses exhibit greater liver growth compared to left-sided CDH. Liver herniation disrupts the normal positive correlation between" normal liver and lung growth.

Rachel Joung (senior author: Ryan Merkow) <u>published</u> "Evaluation of a National Quality Improvement Collaborative for Improving Cancer Screening" and concluded that the national QI col-

laborative, Return-to-Screening, was associated with restoration of cancer screening following the deficits that occurred during the COVID-19 pandemic.



Jes Sanders (senior author: Joe Leventhal) <u>reviewed</u> the mechanisms by which loss of peripheral tolerance leads to autoimmunity and the role of Foxp3+ Tregs in

allograft tolerance.



Chicago Surgical History: DID YOU KNOW?



In honor of National Women Physician Day (February 3, 2023), let's remember Dr. Mary Harris Thompson (1829-1895), one of the first women to practice medicine in Chicago and possibly the first female surgeon in the U.S. Since neither of

Chicago's hospitals at that time permitted women to serve on staff, and one of them did not admit women patients, Thompson organized her own hospital. She was founder, head physician and surgeon of the Chicago Hospital for Women and Children (1865) and founder of the Women's Hospital Medical College (the first medical school for women in the Midwest, 1870) and Chicago's first nursing school (1874). In 1872, the Women's Hospital Medical College was destroyed by the Great Chicago Fire and Thompson moved patients to private homes, where she and her staff treated burn victims, male and female, while classes were held a few blocks away. In 1892, the

College was taken over by the Northwestern University and renamed the Northwestern University Woman's Medical College, which closed in 1902.

Lauren Janczewski (senior author: Leah Tatebe) <u>published</u> a commentary, "Racial Inequities in Emergency Surgery Consultation in Medicare Patients." JAMA Surgery

Audra Reiter, Gwyneth Sullivan, and Andrew Hu (senior author: Mehul Raval) <u>published</u> a study on pediatric patient and caregiver responses to preand postoperative surveys about surgery preparedness, perioperative expectations, PROMIS measures for overall health and pain, and reaching milestones. They found strong agreement on milestones and PROMIS health questions and moderate to strong agreement on PROMIS pain questions, concluding that, "caregivers' responses may be acceptable when some patientlevel responses are not available."
